

A Proclamation

His Excellency Governor Deval L. Patrick

- hereas The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has the unique distinction of being the most Irish-American state in the United States of America, with 23% of all residents claiming Irish ancestry; and
- hereas The Irish-American community of Massachusetts has a distinguished tradition of celebrating St. Patrick's Day dating back to March 17, 1737, when the Charitable Irish Society of Boston, formed to assist fellow citizens in need, held the first Irish commemoration in the thirteen colonies; and
- hereas During the Irish Potato Famine of the 1840s and 1850s, thousands of Irish found refuge on our shores, quickly becoming part of the fabric of Massachusetts as police officers and firefighters, soldiers, tradesmen, mill workers, teachers and scholars, and public servants; and
- hereas Many Irish and Irish Americans, such as artist John Singleton Copley, musician Patrick S. Gilmore, astronaut Christa Corrigan McAuliffe, Senator Edward Kennedy and President John F. Kennedy, have made outstanding contributions to our Commonwealth and nation; and
- hereas Throughout the month, Irish groups across the Commonwealth are organizing parades, concerts, dances, literary readings and other special events designed to celebrate Irish heritage, history and culture,
